Gautraud's Travels Shatter Old Image Of 'One World'

Mr. Albert Gautraud, of the Social Studies Department, spent the past year gathering information about the structure of various cultures while on world

Among the places he visited was the Soviet Union, Japan, India, Afghanistan, Singapore, Hong Kong, the Philippines, and the various nations of the Middle

"One University student in Moscow refused to come to our hotel to talk, the reason being that he would be arrested for talking to the Americans. There is this feeling of everybody watching the other," said Mr. Gautraud, "the Soviet people are frightened of the military government, it is a police state. You just don't decide to go to the Soviet Union, first you must give exact information as to what you are going to do, everything must be paid for in advance, everything must be pre-arrange. It would be impossible to stay in Moscow for a few extra days just because you felt like it. However, this feeling is present mostly in Leningrad and Moscow, in the Georgian area the people are very different and

"There will never be peace in the Middle East" continued Mr. Gautradu, "the Christian Arabs are as anti-Israel as the Moslem Arabs. The guerilla raids and hostilities will continue. Although the Arabs outnumber the Israelis, they do not have the training or education that the Israelis have."

"I had State Department permission to enter The People's Republic of Chine, but the Chinese embassys in both Hong Kong and New Delhi refused to give me an entrance visa."

"The most underdeveloped country in the world must surely be Indonesia. Political corruption there is extreme. One can see this in the 'foolish spending of money' on extra-

vagant statues to the leaders." "The real dilemma in these

underdeveloped countries is due to the extreme exploitation by the Curopean countries. As the Europeans went into these areas, they developed the land to a point which the natives could not have done by themselves, However, the money was syphoned out of the areas. When the Europeans pulled out, the people were left with matters they could not handle."

"The Communists in Hong Kong are like the Klu Klux Klan in America." Mr. Gautraud said that he felt the presence of Chinese Communism in Hong Kong was very obvious.

When asked for a view concerning what situation these various events put the United States in, Mr. Gautraud remarked "the Soviets are no threat, certainly not the Chinese. South East Asians hate the Chinese," In the of hositilites Indonesians would kill all the in the country." Chinese (Chinese people own 79% of all business in Indonesia.) "If war broke out, the Czechs and the Rumanians would break away from the Soviets. The reason for the Soviet invasion of Czechoslovakia was simply that if the Czechs had gotten away with their reform, the Soviet people would have wanted the same."

"I don't believe we live in one world, I used to believe this. The United States is so far ahead of everybody else, with everything we have, including education, that the rest of the world will never catch up. The gap will never close up, it will get wider."

Recruiting Of Negro Faculty Element Fails

The recruiting of Negroes for faculty staff positions at Terra Linda High School has been given considerable effort, to no avail.

Dr. John Plank, Superintendent, has announced that efforts to that effect have been extremely difficult. The main problem has been that Negro teachers are hesitant about becoming "the only one" on the staff. They prefer to join staffs which already have Negroes on them. The one Negro teacher in the district is resigning because her husband is moving. Dr. Plank said, however, that he intends to extend the efforts being made to recruit Negores, next year.

The average age of our new faculty staff members proves to be in the late twenties. The middle aged American, according to recent statistics, is 27.5 years old.

Ideas Sought For Variation

Familiar to all students is the often heard grudge concerning the Pledge of Allegiance.

Recently the San Rafael Teacher's Association announced that they were open to suggestions for a "variation in the required patriotic observance," Dr. John Plank, Superintendent, remarked that there were a number of ideas at present, one of which would involve rotation of patriotic observances among the members of each classroom.

It is a state law that patriotic observance is mandatory, but the local Board of Education has the authority to declare the means of observance.

Mr. Frank Stocking, Principal said that no conclusion has been reached at this point, but that the SRTA is seeking new ideas for consideration. Whatever the alternative to the present observance is, it will have to be an effective ceremony meeting state law requirements. Once in possession of a promising alternative, the SRTA would make a recommendation to the Board of Education.

The VOICE urges students to comment on this matter, keeping in mind that innovative ideas on the behalf of students will be considered by the SRTA.

Mulhaupt Sees Major Split In School Society

Rick Mulhaupt, the President of this year's Student Body, declared in a VOICE interview that he anticipates a further split between the two major factions of our school society.

He loosely described these factions as "liberal minded individuals" and the "cheer-leading young socialites". Rick sees the problem resulting from severe differences in attitudes towards the many social aspects of student life. The "liberal minded individuals" see, as an example, "the football enthusiasts as living in a plastic world", while the "enthusiasts" seem to see the "individuals" as "dirty Hippies".

"The task of the student government," said Rick, "must be to try to provide equally for both groups." "A polarization has occurred whereby the establishment is now rejecting the Hippies." Rick questioned the adequacy of the term "Hippy", and said, "whoever tries to be or define himself as a Hippy, to me, is one."

On the matter of band presentations during lunch, Rick declared that he would leave that job to the Commissioner of Assemblies. "I do not anticipate that we will have bands play at noon during the football and basketball season. They would probably distract from the rallies." He did propose the possibility of "an open gym available for bands to practice." "In the past, the Student Council has not come to the people, the people had to seek the Council. I propose a reversal of that." The Terra Linda High School community "is physically in a hole, bearing an isolated attitude where present actions are based on previous (local) examples." Rick feels that the answer to this problem lies in inter-school communication through our Student Council.

If one word was picked to be the theme of Youth - 68 the word would be INVO LVEMENT. This has been the year for student social and political involvement. Both high school and college students have startled their communitues by caring what happens to their lives and the society they live in, and by doing something

Last spring became the era of new hope. Those who were old enough to fight but not old enough to vote found that they could try to change the world. Eugene McCarthy started it all, leading his "Children's Crusade" to victory in New Hampshire. The traditional idealism of youth had found an anchor. Later those who could not find a cause in McCarthy's "Lincoln-like simplicity" found it in Robert Kennedy's youthful stamina.

It would seem that now, not only parents but their own contemporaries are questioning the motives of the young crusaders. The most common reason given for involvement is strong feeling toward Vietnam or some other social problem. Others felt the need for a young idealistic president and at lat "there was a choice." the more romantic and the disillusioned, it was that allimportant feeling of doing something real!

The most common criticism seems to be that the involvement was leading toward youth conformity or was used as an attentiongetting rebellion. No doubt for each campaign worker, no matter to what degree he or she was involved, there was a mixture of motives; a chance to meet new people, a means of off-campus involvement, a cause (there's a little crusader in all of us). Many of the motives were partially if not purely emotional; you're sickened by the war pictures in every morning paper, you know McCarthy will lose so you work harder (for the underdog cause), you work hard for McCarthy out of contempt for Robert Kennedy's late entry, or you worked hard for Kennedy out of reaction to his brother's death.

The motives for involvement were a combination of all these things, idealism (a characteristic of youth), belief in the peace effort and/or the candidates, curiosity (a yearning to find out if people can really run their government), and a rare mixture of social consciousness, discontent and hope.

Many wonder if this enthusiasm can prove dangerous. If young heads are too clouded with emotion and idealism, they could hurt the country, it's said. However it appears that so far only benefits have resulted. The youth of this country have proved that "America is ready for a new kind of politics - a politics of personal responsibilities, based on knowledge and reason. *Senator Eugene McCarthy

This was done by means of a school candy sale. The Peace Corps assigned \$850.00 of the \$1,000.00 to build a school in the Nagonda District of India. The villagers collected 2,000 rupees (approximately \$730.00) to contribute as their share in the cooperative project in addition to building the school.

Split and Criticism Will Be Cause of Bitter Reactions

. . . And so another long, hot summer passes . . . torn by violence, divided by the bullet as it passed through a soldier in a far-off jungle, through a powder blue helmet in Berkeley, or Harlem, or Chicago . . . divided by the bullet that has indiscriminately pierced both black skin and white . . . and has rested finally in the heart of the most prosperous nation in the world.

For those students, passive or active, who have been chosen to reject the status quo there is the search for an outlet. "Who can I reject first --- who is most vulnerable?"

Within Terra Linda, Santa Venetia, and Marinwood, there is an obvious lack of vulnerable targets on either side. For the merchants, the Northgate hip crowd seems adequate. On the other hand those who wish to drop out find sufficient protest through vandalism or by turning on. Still, a problem is beginning to show itself.

This can be seen best, perhaps, in this school. Although almost everyone here comes from the same type of neighborhood and surroundings, there are those who live only for the next

football game or for Homecoming Week, and there are those who leave school on Friday for the Haight, or for streets near the Berkeley induction center.

I see such a division in our school coming about and I fear the polarization which it tends to create. People begin to see only two sides to any issue, take a side, and will not tolerate the other point of view.

This coming year I hope those who take sides, either condemning the plastic world of Terra Linda's "spirit crowd", or those who are violently repulsed by Terra Linda's "hippie" crowd, will realize that the louder they become in criticism, the more bitter the reaction will be. There are two sides to one coin here, and neither side is afraid to condemn the other. I hope that my stating the problem here will help to minimize it before it becomes great. Maybe this will cause a few people to think of the consequences to themselves before they act and remember that tolerance is the name of the game.

To help build up the athletic teams, and to help the P.E. program run smoother, Terra Linda high school has added new facilities.


